Spanish I & II Semester 2

Make-up Credit Only -- Credit .5

June 9 - 27

8:00 a.m. - 11:00 a.m.

Spanish 1 (Semester 2)

Reviewing and learning the basic language and grammar structures of Spanish 1 is the goal of this course. Verb conjugations, uses of *ser* and *estar*, negatives, pronouns, adjectives, present and past tenses, as well as vocabulary will be emphasized. Students will work on speaking and writing using correct grammar to communicate in Spanish.

Spanish II (Semester 2)

This course will focus on reviewing and learning the basic language and grammar structures of Spanish 2. Object pronouns, comparisons, commands, regular and irregular verb conjugations, reflexive verbs, past, imperfect future and subjunctive tenses, and vocabulary will be emphasized. Students will work on speaking and writing using correct grammar to communicate in Spanish.

American Government

Credit .5

June 9 - 27

8:00 a.m. - 11:00 a.m.

A one-semester survey of the U.S. National government. Topics include constitutional history, federalism, Congress, the Presidency, political parties, voting behavior, electoral procedures, and personal rights and freedoms.

Computer Applications I

Credit .5

June 9 - 27

Noon - 3:30 p.m.

Students will be introduced to several facets of computer technology including: computer hardware and maintenance, graphic design, desktop publishing and computer programming. Internet research and ethics in technology will be emphasized throughout the course.

3-D Animation

Credit .5

June 9 - 27

8:00 a.m. - 11:00 a.m.

Designed for those who have already mastered basic computer skills, this is an exciting class for students with an interest in technology. The course uses 3-D animation to teach logic and basic computer programming concepts. Students will create short, animated movies and computer games.

Acrylic Painting

Credit .5

June 9 - 27

8:00 a.m. - 11:00 a.m.

Open to students of all grade levels and artistic abilities. Students will work on sketches, stretch their own canvases and actually paint outside. This course will complete a semester of a Fine Arts requirement. All students must complete two semesters of Fine Arts credit prior to graduation at most schools.

Chemistry (Semester 2)

Make-up Credit Only -- Credit .5

June 9 - 27

8:00 a.m. - 11:00 a.m.

Chemistry 1 will include the review of properties and changes in matter, the periodic table, equations, gasses, acids and bases, nuclear chemistry and chemistry in the environment. Students who need to make up both semesters of Chemistry may contact the school to make arrangements.

Theology

Credit .5

This will be a Biblical-based course. Both Old and New Testaments will be explored in terms of both historical background and modern interpretation. There will be a group service component to this course.

Sat Prep

Credit .5

June 9 - 27

8:00 a.m. - 11:00 a.m.

The SAT Prep is an on-line Princeton Review class. This course will include a review of vocabulary, writing and math, as well as test taking strategies. Students will work both in school and at home to complete the course. A pre and post test is given to allow students to see how they have improved. A teacher will mentor them and monitor their progress.
